

On Sunday, December 8, 2024, nearly 50 members of the MBCA-Minuteman Section met at Boston Symphony Hall for the 37th Annual Theatre & Dinner Meeting Event (once again a sold out event). The highlight of the day was the "Boston Pops Holiday Concert" featuring the famed "Boston Pops Orchestra" under the direction of conductor Keith Lockhart. This year's performance featured outstanding orchestral renditions of "The Adoration of the Magi, frrom Three Botticelli Pictures", "A Christmas Prelude: Angels from the Realm of Glory", "Illumination of Chanukah", "Let There Be peace on Earth" and the world premiere of "Carol of The Brown King" (including a slide presentation and narration). After intermission "The Pops" performed its more traditional holiday songs, including its famous "The Twelve Days of Christmas" with its highly amusing accompaniment by the "Tanglewood Festival Chorus". Lisa Hughes and David Wade, co-anchors at WBZ – Boston TV, recited "Twas the Night before Christmas" and a brief visit by Santa, himself followed, with the children in the audience in awe! The show concluded with the crowd participating in the annual Christmas Carol Sing-a-Long.

ROAD TRIP TO MONTREAL By Heather Renzoni


In April 1990, my parents purchased their first and only Mercedes: a 560 SEC. They had always driven Ford Thunderbirds and then moved on to Lincoln Continentals.


They thought a Mercedes for road trips would be nice as a second car. Some of their favorite summer road trips were to Canada; Toronto, Quebec City and my mother's favorite: Montreal. My father kept the car garaged all winter, so that it was never exposed to salt or sand. He loved hand waxing the exterior and used the leather polish for the interior. Under the hood, the engine was so clean - like brand new! When he was no longer driving, I would joyfully drive him out for coffee and errands. He maintained the service and any needed repairs. Since 1999, I have been driving Mercedes cars of my own - and in 2022, my father gave his Mercedes to me.

I now care for the car the same way. Every winter the car is in storage December to April. Routine maintenance when needed, polished and waxed every season. The mileage is only 83,000 original. This past September, along with my son, we drove to Montreal. The 560 SEC glided on the interstate winding through Vermont into Canada, as it did so many times before.

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BOOK REVIEW: MERCEDES-BENZ, THE 1960S, W111 TWO- AND FOUR-DOOR: FROM THE 220B SEDAN TO THE 220SEB CABRIOLET

Those of us who are fans of a very specific chassis number or model Mercedes often search for detailed information on "our car." But sometimes shy of getting access to the Mercedes-Benz archives, well-researched and hard-to-find details are — well — hard to find!

Good news for Fintail fans: if you own, are interested in, are considering buying, or just plain like classic Mercedes W111 "heckflosse" (fintails like Goldfinger's) from the 1960's you MUST buy this book.

Honestly, I've read this book (more like a large format paperback coffee table book with waaaay more detail than a standard hardcover or paperback) cover to cover at least three or four times, and certain chapters like the one on interpreting datacards many more times over.

Backstory: I am a former W111 owner, gearhead, and even read books on Mercedes in German. Ok, a little obsessed =] but we all need hobbies we love!

As a young man, I remember reading in Motor Trend of 'bank vault solidity' found in these mostly hand-built Mercedes, and it was true. There is almost nothing like the solid "thunk" sound of a 1960s or 1970's Mercedes-Benz door closing.

And the interior smell. I used to sit on the black MB Tex seats in my 1964 220S heckflosse and inhale. It was an easy driver, since Onkel Bernhard had swapped in a different engine with an automatic instead of the column shift manual.

Fond memories aside, let's be real: there are other realities of owning a 1960s Mercedes. Rust, for instance. Under the doorsills, under the trunk mats, beneath the chrome trim around the windows. Hard starting in wet weather, depending on the quality of the seal on your distributor cap. If you own one, and it's been sitting outside awhile or raining hard you know what I'm talking about!

The author doesn't shy away from those facts, and offers a pretty detailed "buyers guide" with pictures of trouble areas and what to look for, and what to walk away from when considering a vehicle.

Pictures of pristine restored undercarriages, engine compartments and interiors are like catnip for those of us who wish our cars looked like that. But again - to balance that "ideal" with reality - there are lots of pictures in the buyers guide of what to look out for - real world underbodies and engine bays in conditions much more likely to be seen when considering a classic that isn't a full restoration.

There are chapters on engines, chassis, data cards, interiors, resale value, how to buy a W111, even color pictures of interior fabrics and available velours.

There are chapters of hard-to-find material including interior color codes and paint codes with "paint chip pictures" from the Mercedes Benz archives. The book even describes the difference between the chassis number you find in the painted-over plate on the front crossmember by the radiator, and the stamped steel one.

The data card chapter itself is fascinating. It talks about how to interpret the "cells," what each number means, and how common each one is. To me one of the many interesting "cells" in the data card is "wenig gewünscht," which literally translates as little wished for, or special options. Those familiar with data cards know there are cells identifying items installed like the brand of battery, headlamps or tires.

Of note: options like air-conditioning don't typically appear on the data card, because the vast majority were installed at the dealer – made by either Behr or Kühlmeister in the 60's and early 70's.

The author includes a chapter on how he fell in love with the W111 - like me, his German uncle owned one - black with a wool interior (much more frequently ordered in Europe than for example, MB-Tex in the states).

In fact, he mentions that many were ordered without radios, and that the fuel injected SE was considered somewhat frivolous as long as an S was on the trunk after the model number.

He makes another interesting point: if you were a German private citizen in the early 1960s and you owned a Mercedes Fintail, you were rich. Or you were a taxi driver and drove one of the less expensive, smaller displacement, poorer-optioned diesel versions.

An additional chapter talks about one of the "founding fathers" at Mercedes-Benz who I have written about in the past.


The book is enjoyably written (though obviously translated from native German - which to me gives it even more credibility), utterly bingeworthy, and has great pictures and facts.


